



Richard "Dick" E. Waddell

April 15, 1934 - January 8, 2020

Richard "Dick" E. Waddell, 85, of Indianapolis, passed away Jan. 8, 2020. He was born April 15, 1934, in Kansas City, Mo., to the late Richard Antes and Christina Alois Waddell. Mr. Waddell served in the U.S. Army from 1957-59. He received a Bachelor's of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Oklahoma, where he met his wife. Ramona A. Conley, and a Master's Degree of Electrical Engineering from New York University. Mr. Waddell worked as an electrical engineer for ATT's Bell Laboratories for 33 years until his retirement in 1989. He also worked four years for the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission.

A prostate cancer survivor, Mr. Waddell was active for many years in prostate cancer support groups. Into his 70s, Mr. Waddell tutored students at North Central High School in math. Mr. Waddell had been a member of Faith Presbyterian Church since 1962, where he was a ruling elder.
