



## Scott S. Enochs

April 17, 1972 - May 2, 2018

Scott S. Enochs, 46, of Indianapolis, passed away May 2, 2018. He was born April 17, 1972, in Indianapolis, to Richard A. Enochs and Lynne Steventon Enochs. Scott graduated from Warren Central High School. After working as a courtesy clerk for Central Hardware, Scott went on to discover his true calling and became a landscaper. Employed by Altum's, Landscapes Unlimited and several companies in Castle Rock, Colorado, Scott found a thing he loved to do and got paid to do it.

He was a fisherman, a backcountry camper, a lumberjack, a reader of maps and compasses, a gamer, a botanist, a rock climber and a through hiker. Scott taught himself to identify plants, trees and birds as well as play the bass guitar. He was an old soul, wise and transparent, incapable of lying. He instantly connected with cats and dogs, very young people, very old people and all the ages in between. He was constantly and thoroughly funny, and for his nieces, he was playful and attentive every birthday, every holiday, the game master and the fun uncle every kid hopes she has in her life.

Scott was many things to many people, but as a landscaper, he had instincts and skills that are hard to learn. He also had a creative vision that allowed him to see what might be possible in particular environments and a loyalty and commitment to help see the project through to its end.

Visitation will be Monday, May 7, 2018 from 4:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. at Shirley Brothers Washington Memorial Chapel, 9606 E. Washington Street. We will

have an informal service beginning at 7:00 p.m. where we welcome mourners to pay their respects and share their Scott stories with us.

One person makes a difference and losing that one person will change the lives of the many who will survive him, including his mother, Lynne S. Enochs; brother, Mark B.
